EARTH MONTH

April was Earth Month in Honolulu, with April 22 being celebrated as Earth Day on our island home and around the globe. This year's theme, Invest in Our Planet, focused on bringing awareness to the investments in time, money, and attention needed to ensure a bright future for our all our residents, from keiki to kūpuna.

Each year, the City's Office of Climate Change, Sustainability and Resiliency works with departments across the City to compile and publish the City's Annual Sustainability Report. This document, first published in 2019, tracks the City's progress in meeting our sustainability, clean energy, and other important green goals. Highlights in this year's report include:

- 4% decrease in City energy consumption
- 10 additional electric buses added to the City transit fleet, for a total of 17 e-buses
- Adoption of the City's first-ever O'ahu Pedestrian Plan
- 15% increase in the number of registered electric vehicles and 9% increase in the number of public electric vehicle charging stations available across O'ahu
- A new multi-sector institutional commitment to purchasing local agriculture products
- 21% decrease in the amount of waste (municipal solid waste and construction and demolition waste) generated in the last five years
- \$2.55 million in federal hazard mitigation funding awarded to the City

During Earth Month, many City departments also facilitated community activities promoting sustainability. From the Board of Water Supply's "Detect a Leak Week," which encourages residents to check their homes for leaks to conserve water and save money, to the Department of Facility Maintenance's Pearl Harbor Bike Path community clean-up, there were many opportunities for residents and City employees to get involved in celebrating Earth Month.

CHINATOWN FOOD WASTE COMPOSTING PILOT

On O'ahu, food waste comprises about 20% of the overall solid waste stream. As the City looks to reduce waste overall, food waste is a key target for innovation. In April, City staff announced that, three months into implementation, the O'ahu Compost Project continues to successfully divert food waste and excess food from O'ahu's waste stream. Edible, quality excess foods are redistributed to feed people, and food scraps are composted in an in-vessel composting unit that produces valuable soil amendment products.

Once a week, Aloha Harvest also picks up bins of food scraps from participating restaurants, free of charge, in a flatbed truck donated by the GIFT Foundation. The bins were donated by the Department of Environmental Services and are each equipped with a lid-lock to prevent pests, smells, and rubbish contamination.

The food scraps are taken to Full Circle Farm in Waimānalo, where they are processed in a stateof-the-art composting system and turned into highquality compost. Learn more about the Oahu Compost Project at resilientoahu.org/ocp.

O'AHU AGRICULTURE GRANTS



Last year, the City's Office of Economic Revitalization (OER) announced the creation of a \$3 million grant program to support Oʻahu's agriculture sector, utilizing funds from the federal American Rescue Plan Act's Fiscal Recovery Funds. The grants are intended to help local farmers, ranchers, and growers increase the production of locally grown crops, providing aid for smaller producers who may not have been eligible for programs intended for larger-scale operations.

In order to reach those small farmers, the Office of Economic Revitalization conducted extensive outreach in person and online. Applications were made available in six of the languages most commonly spoken by O'ahu's agricultural community. For the first time, OER received an application completed entirely in 'Ōlelo Hawaii.

Now that applications are in, the first 65 grant recipients will be announced in the month of May. These grantees represent a wide range of farmers from urban agriculture, livestock, and aquaponics to Native Hawaiian plant propagators and other floriculture. Each grantee will receive a grant worth up to \$50,000 to help recover from the pandemic and increase the production of locally grown fruits, vegetables, and proteins. NEW LEADERSHIP ANNOUNCED FOR KEY CITY DEPARTMENTS

Successful, efficient City operations are driven by expert leadership. In recent months, two leaders have stepped up to the plate to drive execution of key City projects.

The Mayor's **Office of Housing and Homelessness** welcomed **Denise Iseri-Matsubara** as its new Director.

Iseri-Matsubara is joining the Blangiardi administration after spending about seven years at the Hawai'i Housing Finance and Development Corporation (HHFDC), first as a board member and



then as its Executive Director. As part of her role with the Office of Housing and Homelessness, she will also take over leadership of the City's Affordable Housing Working Group.

The **Department of Land Management**, which oversees all of the lands and buildings that are



owned, leased, rented or controlled by the City, also underwent a recent leadership transition. **Catherine**

Taschner, who had served as DLM's Deputy Director since February

2021, has been named the department's Acting Director. Prior to joining the City, Taschner was a partner at a large Honolulu law firm practicing real estate and transactional law.
